Scripture Reading

Exodus 33:12-23

Moses said to God, "See, you have said to me, 'Bring up this people;' but you have not let me know whom you will send with me. Yet you have said, 'I know you by name, and you have also found favor in my sight.' Now if I have found favor in your sight, show me your ways, so that I may know you and find favor in your sight. Consider too that this nation is your people." God said, "My presence will go with you, and I will give you rest." Moses said, "If your presence will not go, do not carry us up from here. For how shall it be known that I have found favor in your sight, I and your people, unless you go with us? In this way, we shall be distinct, I and your people, from every people on the face of the earth."

The Lord said to Moses, "I will do the very thing you have asked; for you have found favor in my sight, and I know you by name." Moses said, "Show me your glory, I pray." And God said, "I will make all my goodness pass before you, and will proclaim before you the name 'The Lord;' and I will be gracious to whom I will be gracious, and will show mercy on whom I will show mercy. But," God said, "you cannot see my face; for no one shall see me and live." And the Lord continued, "See, there is a place by me where you shall stand on the rock; and while my glory passes by I will put you in a cleft of the rock, and I will cover you with my hand until I have passed by; then I will take away my hand, and you shall see my back; but my face shall not be seen."

Sermon

If you've never seen me cook, there are two things you should know. Number one: I always use every single pot, pan, and utensil in the house (this has been independently confirmed by both my parents) - and I have no explanation or reasoning for it. It just always seems to happen that way. And number two: I almost never use a recipe. Or, I'll use a recipe for inspiration but inevitably, I'll get sidetracked by trying something in a different way. Sometimes it works out, and I'll make a note of what I did so I'll know what I do next time. Or, sometimes it goes terribly wrong. I can remember one time in particular when a friend shared her favorite grilled chicken recipe with an apricot balsamic glaze. It sounded amazing, and she swore by it - it was a family favorite. I was cooking dinner for my parents that night, and I figured I'd give it a try. So I cooked like I always do: I dropped some apricot preserves into a saucepan, added a glug of balsamic vinegar, let it bubble for a while, and ta-da! Dinner's ready. Did I follow the recipe? Of course not, I knew the general idea. Did it taste good?

Of course not.

My dad was very sweet though and insisted that it was delicious, but I'm not so sure. The next day, I called my friend and asked what happened, because it just seemed off. Knowing me, she asked if I followed the recipe. I responded:

Of course not.

In many ways, a recipe is like a promise; it's something that can always be counted on to produce the same results every time. So when something goes wrong, we often question the author: hey, what's going on here? Why isn't this working? Why didn't this produce the results I was promised?

In this morning's scripture reading, we hear of Moses' honest conversation with God about promises. Prior to this moment, Moses had wandered through the wilderness for years with a band of unruly Israelites who seemed to be constantly complaining about something. It was a long, difficult journey, and at this point, Moses had had it. It's almost as though he shouted up to the sky, fists clenched, *God*, *where are you?* You promised to be with us, promised to lead us to the Promised Land, but we are so far from that reality. Where are you?

What is most compelling for me about this text is that Moses was so honest. He held nothing back as he questioned God about the future. Moses recounted the many promises God has made to him and to the nation of Israel, then basically called God to task: *You said all of these things. So fulfill Your promise.*

And rather than respond with an impatient sigh and frustrated explanation, God responded in the most curious way: God reassured Moses that he was not alone; that God was there, and there will be peace and comfort. And, God knew Moses' name. God, the Creator of the Universe, the Bringer of Rain, the Mountain Builder, the One whose love is vast as the seas - God knew Moses' name.

God said, "I know you by name."

How beautiful, how comforting that God knew Moses' name, knew his struggles, knew his yearning for peace within his heart and among his people. And in this moment, Moses glimpsed the glory of God - this incredibly powerful, untouchable, cosmic God, fulfilling promises *and* knowing him by name. We hear in this passage that there is still a great mystery shrouding God, for no one can truly gaze upon the Divine. God's glory is too bright, too vast, too all-encompassing for anyone to make sense of the experience.

Even though Moses couldn't see God, he felt the effects of God's glory, and we too can experience awe in God's presence: the changing seasons, the way food nourishes our bodies, the love we share with our family and friends. And we also know that God knows us by name, too, that this intimacy reaches right to our very souls. We take heart in knowing that God remembers the promises of old and of new: God is with us. And, perhaps one of the best promises? We are allowed to question God, to bring God to task, to raise our fists to the sky and shout, *Where are you?*?

Many of us might have grown up thinking we weren't allowed to question God, or even be angry with God. But here, we see Moses modeling a faithful relationship with the Divine. Because here's the thing: I think God prefers our honesty over our silence. It is in those moments of openness and surrender that God's still small voice calls us by name and meets us in the wilderness, ready and willing to talk things through. God reassures us that - even when we mess up, even when we willingly make changes to the recipe and things don't turn out the way we intended - God reassures us that we can't do anything to be cast from God's presence, for we know that nothing can separate us from the love of God through Christ. So may we boldly approach the throne of God with honesty *and* humility, knowing that we don't have the answers. May we courageously ask the questions that have been on our hearts, knowing that God will meet us in the wilderness. And may we take heart in knowing that God will lead us through to the Promised Land. Of course God will. Amen.

Monday, October 19th, 2020

Read Matthew 5:13-16

"You are the salt of the earth; you are the light of the world."

In this time of preparing for winter and potentially needing to quarantine for the better part of the season if there is a larger Covid-19 outbreak, it can be easy to neglect self-care. But making time for ourselves and taking care of our bodies, minds, and spirits is probably the best thing we can do - not just now, but always. If we push aside this essential task, it can be easy to feel down on ourselves and forget who we are. One of the many reasons I love this morning's passage is that it reminds us that we are of sacred worth and loved no matter what. Because here's the thing: salt, chemically, can never actually lose its saltiness. It will always remain salty - and our souls will always remain found in God. Tuesday, October 20th, 2020 Read Hebrews 12:1-3

"Since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight."

As I prepare to go before the Board of Ordained Ministries in February, I recognize that the ordination process is a long journey, and there are many difficult obstacles - for good reason. This discernment process is important, and we want to ensure that all candidates have been properly vetted. A couple of weeks ago, I made it through the District Committee on Ordained Ministry oral exams, but I felt like I had been put through the wringer. As I'm looking over my paperwork, and at times feel overwhelmed, I can't help but be reminded of the many mentors and colleagues who have walked with me throughout my journey. Wednesday, October 21st, 2020

Read Luke 18:1-7

"Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart."

I can remember that as a child, I often tried the "annoy them" tactic to get what I wanted. I would ask again and again, hoping to wear my parents down to eventually resign and say, "FINE, yes, we can get McDonalds for dinner tonight." But, if I remember correctly, it only worked once or twice. Every other time, I realized that they were just as stubborn as I was; but the truth is, they knew what was best for us as a family. In this morning's parable, Jesus tells us a story about a woman who was persistent in her asking, but it wasn't because she was trying to annoy the judge. Rather, her heartfelt pleas were that she would be treated as a human, a woman having lost her husband and having nothing, a woman being legally pursued for something that isn't named. Jesus contrasts the unjust judge's behavior, who eventually gave in because he was annoyed, with God's response, who hears with compassionate ears and ensures those who ask will receive in due time. For many of us, sometimes the length of time between praying and receiving a response can feel too long, but perhaps God is already answering our prayers, simply in the presence of the Holy Spirit. Maybe God is moving throughout our lives, orchestrating a more loving and more full response in due time. So we do not lose heart, for God is always near.

God of answered prayers, even in the silence, we know that You are near. Even in the deepest depths and darkest nights, we feel Your presence. Your Spirit meets us where we are and reminds us of the eternal bond we have with You. Thursday, October 22nd, 2020 Read Psalm 41:1-3

"Happy are those who consider the poor; the Lord delivers them in the day of trouble."

As we gear up for the holidays to come in the next couple of months, we might feel down on ourselves because this year's holidays are going to be much different from previous years. Many of us who may have hoped to travel for the holidays are now making other plans, perhaps plans to stay close to home or to outright cancel cherished traditions. It can be easy to focus on ourselves and feel bad for what we're enduring, but there are many folks in our community and beyond who have much less this year, and whose struggles have greatly increased during the pandemic. Maybe this year, we're being called to focus outward on the needs of others. Maybe this year, we are being moved to compassion out of love rather than pity. Friday, October 23rd, 2020 Read Psalm 27:1-5

"The Lord is my light and salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?"

I used to have an intense fear of thunderstorms when I was little, to the point of panicking when I heard thunder from miles away. My parents would let me sleep in their room when storms would arise, and in those moments, I knew nothing would harm me; I was safe in their presence. As I got older, my dad taught me about the science of thunderstorms and what was actually happening in the clouds and through the weather patterns. I found that the more that I learned, the less I feared thunder and lightning, but I still had a healthy respect for storms. I had found comfort in my dad's words, and though I knew I couldn't sleep in my parents' room forever, I found a different type of peace. In this morning's scripture reading, we hear of the confidence we find in God, knowing that there is nothing that we ought to fear in the presence of God, for God is our light and salvation. God is the stronghold of our lives, and we need not be afraid, even when our enemies rise against us, and even when the storms of life rage. God is our anchor, and we hold fast to the truth that God's love overcomes all and is bigger than our greatest fears. Thanks be to God that we are always held in love and light.

Saturday, October 24th, 2020 Read 1 Corinthians 15:50-58

"Listen, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed."

One of the most beautiful things about being a Christian is recognizing the mystery of our faith and learning to be okay with not having all of the answers. In this morning's passage, we hear a great mystery: how Jesus has defeated death, and that we will suddenly become imperishable and immortal through Jesus' victory. But how exactly does this happen? We know that Jesus died, and we also know that Jesus was resurrected. We're taught that through faith, we inherit Jesus' resurrection and are raised with him in our own death, obtaining eternal life. But how?? How does this work? The truth is that we may never know, not until our day of glory, but isn't that the point of faith? To embrace the mystery before us, knowing that we don't have the answers, but we believe regardless? Perhaps it is in this faith that we are changed, that there is some sort of transformation that is almost like a caterpillar becoming a butterfly: a mystery that reveals itself in beautiful wings that take us to new heights in our relationship with God, of greater trust and love that not only acknowledges the unknown mysteries, but embraces them as part of the journey. How are you being called to embrace mystery in your own life? And where is God revealing truth in these mysteries?

Let Us Pray Together

God of mystery and revelation, You walk with us through the unknowns of life and reveal the beauty of Your love. You remind us that we need not have all the answers in order to have faith in You. Teach us to not only be okay with mystery, but to fully embrace this mystery, that we might be transformed in Your light and love through Jesus. Amen.
